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25 Years of Giving Thanks

Making Thanksgiving basket donations to HomeFront families is a long-standing tradition of warmth and generosity from our friends and neighbors. Thanks to the continued support of congregations, organizations, corporations, schools, and individuals, HomeFront distributes thousands of baskets to area families living in poverty,



This wonderful tradition started with a relatively small idea when Connie Mercer and two friends—Helen Holmes and Joanne Adams—cooked Thanksgiving dinners in their homes and delivered them to families living in squalid motels. In later years, Barbara George and Barbara Kelly, together with their teen-aged daughters, took over delivering meals to each grim motel room, brightening the holiday for many.

"Thanksgiving has always been deeply significant for me," explains Connie. "There is nothing that says 'home' like enjoying Thanksgiving dinner with your family. The families we met in those motels 25 years ago desperately needed, and deserved, that special ritual together."

That idea blossomed into what is now a thriving ritual. All Saints Church got involved early on, coupling the delivery of hot meals to the motels with boxes of Thanksgiving Day fixings for the families who had moved out.

"I'll never forget the first time we served Thanksgiving dinner at the old Family Preservation Center," says Family Campus

The feast, as usual, was accompanied by lots of games and activities for the kids and, just like that first Thanksgiving delivery at the motels, it was accompanied by hefty servings of love and encouragement.

To all those who contributed to make this day special for so many families once again this year, our deepest thanks.

TCNJ Brings Learning Needs Assessment to Family Campus

Last year, The College of New Jersey, under the direction of Learning Consultant Heather Tellier, launched a comprehensive Student Evaluation Clinic to identify learning differences and dyslexia in children and adults in order to move them into environments where they can learn. This clinic has now formed a partnership with HomeFront to bring its services to Family Campus families. "This kind of testing occurs in the school system," explains Family Campus Children's Champion Director, Janine Greene, "but it is often delayed for years, and valuable time is lost. The professionals in the clinic evaluate selected individuals in our programs, from preschool through adult, in a timely way and give them certification to take to their schools in order to get the help they need. We couldn't be more excited about this valuable resource."

Back to School Donations Build Confidence in Kids



Every day, HomeFront works with families who struggle to house, feed and clothe their children. This year, 2,100

We are also reminded of the horrid circumstances faced by homeless families as they maneuvered through endless obstacles in grim motels. Today we offer a haven of healing and hope for families in our beautiful Family Campus as they get back on their feet. We will always face challenges. But we know we will also continue to have compassionate individuals and caring businesses, congregations, schools and organizations working with us who will continue to see the benefit of helping those around us who are less fortunate.







These milestones from the last 25 years that make us grateful—and encouraged as we look forward to the next 25:

- 1990 Connie Mercer and volunteers organize around her kitchen table to deliver food to homeless families in Route 1 motels.
- 1996 Our wonderful after-school program, Joy, Hopes and Dreams, began to enrich children's lives and to mitigate negative developmental effects on children living in motels.
- 1997 Our name was formally changed from the Exchange Club to HomeFront. The first Board of Directors was formed.
- 1999 Connie finds a soul-mate in Celia Bernstein, a real estate professional with a social vision. Our service-enriched housing programs begin and we secure a location for the FreeStore.
- HomeFront purchases our permanent, safe, dignified and affordable residential housing property at Brunswick Court in Trenton.
- 2002 HomeFront opens our new headquarters at 1880 Princeton Avenue in Lawrenceville.
- Our first Family Preservation Center for homeless mothers and children opens in an old dormitory at the Marie Katzenbach School for the Deaf.
- 2005 HomeFront starts to help women get their high school equivalencies. This grows to include Microsoft Office certification. The Hire Expectations program begins.

- 2007 ArtSpace, a comprehensive therapeutic art program, is created by passionate AmeriCorp VISTA worker Ruthann Traylor.
- HomeFront assumes management of the Lawrence Neighborhood Center and begins work creating a vibrant community center for all Lawrence Township residents.
- **2010** Children's Programs evolve to include academically-enriched and always fun summer camps.
- We begin a pilot program to teach parents how to cook healthy meals on a budget. Groups meet once a month at Chambers Walk Café in Lawrenceville.
- After years of work and planning, HomeFront's New Family Campus, a one-stop social service campus of healing and hope, becomes a reality.

"I had my son 12 years ago and without HomeFront, I would have had to give him away. They taught me how to depend upon myself. I am working hard now and saving money and I think I am a pretty good mother! I work from 2:30 in the afternoon until 10:30 at night and I wish that HomeFront was able to provide 24-hour childcare."

"In 2009 I was pregnant and living with my one-year-old son at home with my mom in Lawrence when everything came crashing down. My mom passed away and I had no way to pay the rent on her apartment and was about to become homeless. Someone told me about HomeFront and my child and I ended up at the Family Preservation Center and stayed there for a whole year. They had their work cut out for them with me! I had always had my mom or dad to lean on and wasn't used to doing things for myself.

"Today I am the manager of my husband's roofing business and we are such a happy family. I owe my blessings to the angels at HomeFront. My wish is that they will always, always be there for people like me."



Paula

"I was working two jobs paying \$1,300 rent a month and \$300 a week for my daughter's tutoring. I was spending all of my paycheck on bills and I lost my car because I couldn't make the payments. Celia Bernstein heard about my plight and changed my life with a car and a lovely HomeFront apartment. My wish is that HomeFront would get an enormous amount of money and expand into other states. There are people like me everywhere."

"HomeFront is like the best family anyone could hope for. I have a little girl who is legally blind and, after losing my apartment last February, I came to HomeFront with nothing. The case managers there took a real interest in me and my daughter. I thought I had found an apartment and was so excited but two weeks later the landlord gave it away. I was so distraught but then I met with Miss Cari and she told me my daughter was eligible for a special program, which means a better home and better schools. Now

we are in a two bedroom house with HomeFront furniture and a backyard! Miss Liza also found me a new opthamologist for my daughter who says she is getting better! She still attends daycare at HomeFront while I'm at work.

"I am so grateful to HomeFront and proud that I can help them now. I coordinated over \$5,000 worth of donated items for them from Babies-R-Us.

"My wish for them is to thrive and continue to be who they are. I want them to go on and on and on..."

Family Campus Echoes with the Beat of Drum Circle Healing

What brings people together, relieves stress, gets the endorphins pumping, and ALWAYS results in a good time? Beating a drum, of course! HomeFront's ongoing commitment to holistic healing added a new chapter in October, when we launched an exciting collaboration for a monthly dinner and drumming circle with The Trenton Children's Chorus, the homeless children at the Family Campus, and at-risk children in our Joy, Hopes, and Dreams program. The dinner was provided by the Feed Truck, a Christian nonprofit organization.

After the meal, the pulsing fun began. Eric Thomas of The Trenton Children's Chorus did a great job as the drum circle conductor, getting about 50 kids aged 3 to 16 to participate with enthusiasm.

Linda Helm Krapf, executive director of The Trenton Children's Chorus, is thrilled with the new collaboration and underscores



the immense positives that stem from drum circles: "The ancient art of drumming builds community by bringing people together to cut across all lines that divide us."

Special Interns Earn College Credit While Impacting Lives

HomeFront is the ideal place for an undergraduate or graduate school intern to get their feet wet in the field of social work. The unpaid interns receive college credit while working 15 to 20 hours per week at various HomeFront sites—the Family Campus shelter and WorkFirst program, the Lawrence Community Center, and the emergency services center at the HomeFront headquarters in Lawrenceville.

HomeFront focuses the internship on experiences that provide

an in-depth understanding of what social work entails. The interns observe HomeFront's case managers at first, but soon begin to help with paperwork and work directly with clients. They meet weekly with Larry Wenger, HomeFront's Intern Coordinator, for guidance and feedback, and also receive an end-of-term evaluation. The student interns have performed very well, and HomeFront is proud to be entrusted by the colleges with training the next generation of social workers.
